












2018 Washington District Report - United in Purpose

The Mission of The Washington District Is to Empower, Enable and Equip Its Member Congregations to Recruit, Develop, Train and Nurture Disciples for The Lord Jesus Christ.

As a people, a nation, a faith community-we have had to come to grips with more and more people looking to the church for answers to foreclosures, food shortages, lack of affordable healthcare and shelter.

REVIEWING OUR PRACTICES

Christian Education

The benediction of the Christian Education Department is "Every member a Christian - every Christian a Worker- a worker trained that need not be ashamed. This we ask in Jesus name." The Christian Education department of the Washington District has strived to make this statement a reality by actively participating in Christian Education on the local, district, conference, regional and connectional levels throughout the conference year.

Departments of Christian Education are active in many of our congregations across the district. While the size and demographics of our local churches vary, many of our churches have adapted and developed effective ministries to serve and advance the work of building credible Disciples of Christ. One area of focus across the District continues to be on our youth and young adult populations. As educators, we understand the dynamics and balancing act many of our youth and young adults face. Therefore, we are striving and continue to seek new opportunities to effectively engage and minister to these populations.

The Department- in conjunction with the lay council, evangelism and missionary societies - participated in the Back to School Rally in August at St. Lucille. The Christian Education Department was able to supply over 50 backpacks and supplies for our children across all grades. During the instruction portion of the meeting, the children and youth were able to express their thoughts on bullying via art, and the Christian Education department lead a discussion about bullying that was well received.

For Christian Education month, the Department held an afternoon service in September at Contee. The service was sponsored by the young adults and featured a psalmist and spoken word artist. We are grateful to the St. Lucille church choir, Rev. Dr. Hanna Broome and the Contee church for a very rich and impactful worship experience.

On regional and connectional levels, members of the district attended and participated in the Eastern Region Meeting in Pittsburg, PA. Additionally, the district hosted the eastern region meeting of ACE (Assembly of Christian Educators) in November at John Wesley. Members of the district were asked to present on the topic "Creating Credible Disciples in Love". Members

of the district also attended and participated in the Christian Education Mid-Winter meeting in Atlanta in December.

The highlight of the conference year occurred during our "District at Study" time in February. Instead of having a separate convocation and Black History program, the department worked in conjunction with the Missionary Society to organize the day to accomplish the intended outcome. Following Missionary Mass Meeting, Rev. Mark Thomas discussed the concept of Sabbath from the book Mudhouse Sabbath by Lauren Winner, which was highlighted during the Spiritual Emphasis week in January. Following Rev. Thomas presentation, Rev. Stacey Lytle facilitated a panel discussion on the topic of hospitality and welcoming those disenfranchised by the church. The panel included a youth; a person wounded by the church but still loves God, and a minister who is LBGTQAI. During the lunch hour, each church developed Black History displays for the walking history museum. All departments participated, and the event was well attended.

Members of the previous district youth council participated in events throughout the conference year. While they were not as active as envisioned, I want to take this opportunity to thank them for their service and representing the district in Atlanta. We look forward to working with the newly elected council in the upcoming conference year for ways to engage more youth in the work of Christian Education. As Christian Educators, we thank you for attending every meeting, training opportunity, conference call and service as we strived to create effective ministry opportunities to promote Christian living. We are anticipating even greater works in 2018-2019.

Thank you for your patience as our family increased, and for the opportunity to serve in this capacity.

Blood Pressure screening was available sponsored by the Washington District Health Ministry, under the leadership of Mrs. Linda Pettaway, District Health Coordinator.

The **Third Quarterly Mass Meeting** was held at Trinity A.M.E. Zion Church, Rev. Dr. Timothy Freeman, host Pastor. This meeting was held in conjunction with the District at Study and Black History Celebration sponsored by the Christian Education Department. Everyone was asked to wear red in recognition of Women's Heart Health also in observance of Agape month. Mrs. Sandra Baker, Second Mile Coordinator, gave us information on the Agape Celebration. Our presenter/speaker was Dr. Patricia Davidson, a medical internist and cardiologist. She gave us pointers on what we need to do to live a healthy life, mainly healthy eating and exercise. She reminded us that our bodies are God's temple and we need to take care of our temple. The health team, under the leadership of Mrs. Linda Pettaway, distributed information on matters of the heart. Prison Ministry Report

- Over 2.2 million individuals are in jail or prison in the United States.
- Approximately 95% of incarcerated individuals are eventually released into local communities nationwide.
- Finding stable employment is crucial to ensuring that individuals do not reoffend.
- Having a record reduces the likelihood of a job callback or offer by as much as 50 percent.
- White men with a criminal record are more likely to get an interview than Black men with no criminal record.
- In 2014, the imprisonment rate for African American women (109 per 100,000) was more than twice the rate of imprisonment for white women (53 per 100,000).3
- Hispanic women were incarcerated at 1.2 times the rate of white women (64 vs. 53 per 100,000).

This has been a very active, busy and dynamic year for all and especially the Department of Evangelism and Church Growth. There have been several attempts to pull the committee together throughout the year for strategic planning. Beginning with the Evangelism accolades must be given to Revs. Peaks and Shroud for the evangelistic efforts throughout the conference year. This is their first year as Co-Directors for this ministry and they have been dedicated, committed and tenacious towards accomplishing their goals. They have had several conference calls and meetings to develop and plan their evangelistic efforts and while there have been challenges I must applaud them for continuing to work towards the goal in God's kingdom. While it was initially planned for one or both directors to attend the Evangelistic Conference in Black Mountain secondary to changes on the denominational level this goal did not materialize. However, they planned and executed a day of Prayer at Union Wesley and it was a moment of ministry that allowed the district to gather for prayer and intent focus on our ministry goals as we close out this conference year.

The Church Growth committee will hopefully be able to have more focused intent strategic plans in the coming year. There was an exploration of possible ministry opportunities in Southern Maryland towards Waldorf however there are many challenges with new ministry in that county. The Charles County area is ripe for growth and there is no presence of the AME Zion Church but launching ministry in this area will take more careful examination and methodical strategies to initiate ministry. At the last check-up meeting there was a presentation about a conference re-alignment of districts and when and if this restructuring happens with the approval of the Presiding Elder we will explore new ministry opportunities in that new formula. This was a great year, and much more could have been done but with God's grace and another opportunity to engage in this work change and growth can become actualized.

State of The Church Report

To Presiding Elder Rita Colbert, Pastors, District Officers and Delegates, I beg leave to make the following report:

As we begin this State of the Church Report 2018, we begin with a question which is asked by believers and unbelievers, Christians and non-Christians, churched and unchurched alike; what is the purpose of the church? Acts 2:42 gives us what the purpose of the church should be, stating, "And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers".

According to this verse, the purpose of the church is, teaching biblical doctrine, providing a place of fellowship, observing the Lord's Supper and praying. The tenets of this verse is found in what we call the "means of grace", those things or means through which God gives His grace invisibly in disciples, those who are committed to following Him by guiding, strengthening and confirming faith. According to John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, the" means of grace" can be divided into two (2) categories, experienced or shared individually and communally. They are works of piety, to include, prayer and fasting, searching/reading scriptures and healthy living; additionally, the communal practices of communion and baptism; the works of mercy which focuses on individual needs of good works, visiting the sick and imprisoned, feeding and clothing those in need, to include general and societal needs of seeking justice and opposing slavery as seen in scriptures of Matthew 25:36-40 and Micah 6:8

Also, the purpose of the church is to equip believers in Christ with the tools they need to overcome sin and remain free from the pollution of the world as well make Disciples. A valuable tool which began the Methodist Movement, thus becoming the Methodist Church was the Class Leader System. The Class Leader System was effective in growing the church, but now due to the system not being used as a catalyst for spiritual growth in the lives of the people in the local church, rather in many cases just to collect quarterly conference dues; it has become ineffective throughout this conference and beyond. This system was started in 1742 as a way to pay off a building in Bristol, London, by dividing the church into groups and collecting a penny from those who were able to afford it.

But it was later discovered that the people called Methodists were not keeping the General Rules which were to do no harm, do good and practice the means of grace. Mr. John Wesley decided that the best people suited to address the lack of discipline were the leaders and their duties were also described in the General Rules. (General Rules, pages 19-21, 2016 AME Zion Church Book of Discipline) These class meetings were held to hold the people accountable of the general rules; it was a place where every Methodist weekly answered the question, "How is it with your soul", which has since been rephrased, "How is your life with God" and it was the place where Methodist were encouraged to give weekly to the poor. (Class Leader Meeting, pages 105-106, 2016 AME Zion Church Book of Discipline)

As the early church invited people into their lives and was willing to become transparent with others so that together they would grow into grace; as they were committed to the idea and concept that the Christian life is a journey of growth in grace and sanctification towards Christian Perfection; as they believed they needed one another in order to persevere on this journey, could it be as a result of our churches not honoring this system as it was intended our churches have become cold and dry and without the presence and demonstration of the Holy Spirit working and moving in the lives of the people; could it be that holy living is a thing of the past and finally, could it be there is no accountability for each other or have we become a church, a people, according to II Timothy 3:2, who have a form of godliness but denying the power thereof? Unfortunately, the answer to these questions is a resounding yes! In fact, John Wesley was quoted, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid lest they should only exist as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power. And this undoubtedly will be the case unless they hold fast the doctrine, spirit, and discipline with which they first set out". The class leader system is vital to the spiritual growth of the church and the people of which it serves. Another

question that is being asked is, "Is the church still relevant, particularly, the Black Church? Jesus said to Peter emphatically, "Upon this rock, I will build my church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it" is proof the church is and continues to be relevant today! And yes, the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, the Freedom Church, as it is known, is as relevant today as it was at its inception in 1796. The church is still the center of our communities; she still remains a part of the fight and struggle against poverty, violence, injustices and inequality. The church is the hub and continues to be the gathering place where people are nourished and nurtured on this walk with God as well as meeting the needs of this 2pt century. In this era of this present administration, referred to as "Trumpism", the church must continue to be as vigilant as ever to help rid the injustices seen in health care and education, tax reform and against all other forms of oppression against black and brown people and people of color in our communities. The church must continue to be on guard and prepare herself to be a refuge for these times in which we live. The church must be ready to receive and meet the needs, both physically and spiritually, of those who are often marginalized, to include, those with criminal offenses, the unemployed and uneducated, those single mothers and others who will undoubtedly run to the church in these troubled times; she must ever be ready to serve this present age! 'Tis the ale Ship of Zion she has landed many of thousands!

Recommendations:

- We recommend that each local church will reenergize and reestablish the class leader system in the local church. This committee suggests that the pastor of the local church will begin by teaching and by selecting persons as leaders who are of sound judgement and who are truly devoted to God. Refer to the 2016 AME Zion Church Book of Discipline, page 105-106
- We recommend our pastors and church leaders collaborate with other ministries and organizations with resources that are available and current to meet the needs of the community. Incidentally, needs of the people foster ministries and new ministries foster church growth and participation.
- 3. We further recommend that each local church would seek to put in place safety and protective policies and procedures deemed needed for that local body. Also, it is suggested to contact your local police and sheriff departments for additional resources pertaining to church safety. We further recommend Thomas Rainer's seven (7) tips on "How Your Church Should Prepare for an Active Shooter." (Tips Listed Document Upon Request)






















Washington District Local Churches

John Wesley A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Dr. Christopher Zacharias - 284 Members

The congregation welcomed Pastor and Mrs. Zacharias with excitement and great expectations. Several new ministries were introduced which included the Empowerment Academy a monthly training session for laity and ministry leaders. The gentrified community responded positively to the outdoor ministry which included distribution of ashes on Ash Wednesday and palms on Palm Sunday. There has been a concerted effort to connect with other churches in the community by hosting an Open House and creative Saturday Programs. The Restoration and Recovery Ministry (former Sick and Shut-In) is a team visitation that includes the Ministerial Staff, Deaconess, Missionaries, Class Leaders and Choir Members. Community outreach includes the House of Ruth, Harriet Tubman and Garrison Elementary School, Central Union Mission, SOME and World of Work.

Trinity A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Dr. Timothy Freeman – 382 members

Under the leadership of Pastor Freeman this congregation has extended its' self in offering Radical Hospitality by hosting the Mid-Atlantic's Celebration of the elevation of Bishop Moore to the Chair of the Governing Board of the National Council of Churches. They also hosted the Washington District at Study and Washington District Summit. The congregation partners with the Black Student Fund who provide resources that benefit the church and community youth. As a part of the community outreach over 500 people participated in the "Taste of Trinity." They also held a New Artist Musical Showcase and an Oktoberfest that included a "Trunk-Or-Treat." The Melva Martin Scholarship Ministry continues to provide the Annual Thanksgiving Dinner for the homeless which included toiletries and a clothing give away. The Youth Ministry provides leadership to Sunday Church School on Fifth Sunday and the children collected wigs for the GW Cancer.

Union Wesley A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Dr. Alvin Durant – 681 members

Multiple opportunities are provided for Bible Study and Leadership Development. Conducted a "Partners in Ministry Conference" with a focus on "Reviewing Our Practices: Connecting Church and Community" that included members from various community organizations and DC Government along with the congregation to explore opportunities for collaboration to meet the needs of the constituents. Several intergenerational panels examined how to share and appreciate each other's faith, knowledge and life experiences. As an outgrowth of the Lenten Season a bi-weekly exercise ministry was implemented. All Missionary departments along with the Girl Scouts ministered in the parks in DC by giving out blankets, hats and scarves along with hot soup. Other outreach ministries include: the Wesley House, Blair House, Hospital for Sick Children and St. Ann's Home for Infants.

Galbraith A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Pharaad B. Mashal El – 164 members

This conference year the Church launched the "Good News Café" which featured Spoken Word artist, musicians, soloist, dramatic presentations and the work of visual artist. The ministerial staff is active in the community in response to issues that impact city parking and wealth management of intercity property. The Clothing Outreach Center is open two days a week to receive and distribute clothing. The monthly meals for the homeless include an interactive Bible Study. Over 630 pieces of clothing is given away monthly.

Metropolitan Wesley A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Dr. Heath Cheek – 200 members

The Creative Arts Ministry has introduced "Theater on The Lawn" dramatic and liturgical ministry which is done live on the lawn of the church. The Tutorial Ministry continues to be successful and is provided twice a week to students of Lafayette Elementary School. The clothing and feeding program is active year-round and the "Kingdom Kloset" was reestablished. When the weather permits the Men's Ministry hold their meetings outside to establish a dialogue with the men who are outside of the church.

Contee A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Mark A. Thomas – 240 members

Community outreach includes clothing give a-ways, SHARE Site, Angel Tree and Back to School supplies give away. The Children's Ministry is growing and is active on the local and District level. Children and Youth Bible Studies are conducted during the same time as the Adult Studies to encourage young adult attendance. Leadership of ministries by young adults has been encourage and supported by the more seasoned members. The community outreach efforts have been creative and include a Trunk-Or-Treat; Friday Night Movies, a monthly feeding program at the community park, and Dodgeball Challenge. The Senior Ministry is very active and shared information on mail and telephone scams, Medicare and Social Security. The Missionary Society spearheaded an effort to collect toiletries for 400 children who are residences of the DC General Family Shelter. The Church is collaborating with Burrville Elementary School to identify how the Church can provide student support and other resources. Supports the Angel Tree Program

Varick Memorial A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Andre' Green – 149 members

This newly appointed pastor did not waste any time familiarizing himself with the community by attending community meetings walking the neighborhood to introduce himself to residents. As a result, we have had several visitations from the community and 5 people joined. The Deaconess Board presented a Sex Trafficking Presentation given by an overcomer of sex trafficking. The Pastor's Moments of teaching are a highlight of the Super Saturday meetings. Community Service Projects include; S.O.M.E., DC Food Bank, DC Homeless Shelter and Angel Tree. The Youth Ministry leadership seeks out a variety of opportunities in the community to support projects and provide learning experiences for the youth. Very active Senior Ministry. This year the congregation collected medical supplies for Haiti.

North Brentwood A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Brandon J. Pennix, Sr. (33 members)

Outreach efforts have increased this year. The Church identified families during the year to support with food, clothes and toys. A supply pantry was established which uses couponing to provide supplemental household items to those in need. North Brentwood joined with

three other churches to form a Senior Bible Study which is held at the Brentwood Community Center. The Culinary Arts Ministry supports shelters in the community.

Beth Shalom A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Dr. Darrell J. Gaskin – 68 members

The STEM Camp this year was held for a week for grades pre-kindergarten through fifth grade students. Approximately thirty-five students attended daily. Special visitors from INOVA College, the National Science Foundation (NSF), and an electrician helped to make the camp fun and engaging for the participants. Field trips to Howard University and The Air and Space Museum was an extension of the camp. The Sons of Varick supported the Prison Ministry by donating 100 Father's Day Cards to the inmates at the DC Jail. The Men donated Suits to the inmates that were being released from jail to help them be appropriately dressed for job interviews. An Entrepreneurs Workshop was held to give persons insight into the skills required to start a business and encouraged self-reliance. The Charles Strayhorn Scholarship Committee continues to provide support to matriculating students.

St. Lucille A.M.E. ZION

Reverend David G. Elliott – 122 members

As the newly appointed Pastor of St. Lucille, Pastor Elliott held a creative and informative Leadership Academy for members and invited participation from other churches on the District. In addition, there was a Lay Academy conducted by Mr. Robert Edmonds, President of the Washington District Lay Council focusing on the theme "Reviewing Our Practices". The Bert's Corner Outreach Ministry has stretched to 2nd St. NW to provide a complete meal, hats and scarves to the homeless. Over 130 people were fed and provided with clothing - shoes and toiletries at the Day's Inn Family Shelter. All ministries under the Missionaries participated in the success of this outreach. A lock in was held for the teenagers, and a Metropolitan Police Officer spoke to the teens about human trafficking. Book bags were given to students at the beginning of the school year. The church also adopted and gave support to the Maya Angelou's School. The first Poetry Café was held and included five special guests from the outside as well as the First Lady, ElBonita Elliott, who was a surprise participant. St. Lucille joins with Contee in ministering at the Larkin Chase Nursing Home.

R. L. Jones A.M.E. ZION

Reverend William H. Dent – 56 members

The congregation donated feminine hygiene items, toothbrushes, and running shoes to the "Run for Fun/Black Girls Run Missionary Run" held in the Caribbean. The Christian Education Director participated in the run. The collected items were distributed to ST. Thomas, ST Lucia/Nevis, and Barbados. These islands were devastated by the storms. Ministry outreach includes providing towels, toiletries, and clothes for teens at one of the DC Homeless Shelters and donation of non-perishable items to families. The Annual Fall Church and Community Impact Day was jammed packed starting with cleaning the church and community in the morning and in the afternoon the community was invited to listen to a lecture on Diabetes, guest from Homeland Security, and a presentation on "The Five Wishes." The team from Homeland Security presented the Washington DC emergency plan. The Saturday Church School continues to grow.

Sons and Daughters A.M.E. ZION

Reverend Eddie M. Scarborough, Jr. – 30 members

Sons and Daughters in Christ conducted an out-door worship service in front of the church honoring the hurricane victims. Missionaries made it possible for the church to provide over \$250.00 to feed hungry and homeless persons. One was deaf, and the other individuals were deaf and non-verbal yet they came to Sunday Church School and stayed for Worship Services. The YAMS continue helping homeless individuals, ensuring they know where to go to take care of their business, making hospital visits and feeding those in need. They also provide food to the homeless in the form of money and food gift cards. The Pastor is an enthusiastic street evangelist and well known in the community. Community outreach includes ministering at the Bernice Fonteneau Senior Wellness Center.

Full Gospel A.M.E. ZION

Reverend David DeVerteuil - 57 members

The congregation continues to partner with Glassmanor Elementary school in a mentorship relationship. They partnered with other churches in the St. Barnabas Road corridor to combine their community outreach efforts. Outreach included a Financial and Wellness seminar where 150 bags of groceries were given away. Full Gospel also partnered with Deliverance Temple to provide meals and minister to homeless persons in SE Washington for Thanksgiving. As a result of the children's coat drive, 50 coats along with hats, scarves and gloves were donated to the Spring Hill Lake Elementary school in Greenbelt, MD. Creative approaches to evangelism included an "Old School, New School" basketball game to build relationships with youth and young adults. As a result, 3 young people became members of the church.

Deliverance Temple was successful in obtaining a permanent worship center this year and the Pastor and congregation have positioned themselves as a beacon in the South East DC Community. Deliverance Temple is always in the community engaging in education, evangelism and empowerment. This includes 5 months of Worship in the Park and Vacation Bible School in the Park as well as the Welcome to the Community Cookout. The first Annual Open Table Love Feast was held in partnership with Full Gospel and over 175 people from the community were fed. Other outreach ministries included "Warm Hearts" that gave away 100 children coats, gloves and boots. Food Baskets were also given out at Thanksgiving and Christmas. The Church School has grown as the traditional Sunday School is included as a part of the Deliverance Academy, "Saturday Family Academy". The hour that would normally be used on Sunday's for Sunday School is used to hold the Bread of Life Worship which is an opportunity to hold a Breakfast Ministry for those who are homeless and leave the shelters in many cases with no breakfast.
